FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Carers,

Floor coverings and Painting

We are very excited about the work that will be completed in the next school holidays. We will be utilizing the facilities grant we received to replace the vinyl in the art room, John Western's room and the staffroom.



Painting will also occur in many classrooms, corridors, the library, the staffroom and the front office. Consequently you may have noticed that the school is looking quite bare in areas as we are clearing pinup boards and boxing away books and resources ready for the painting to occur.

I would like to thank staff and volunteers who supported this work and moved furniture and boxed classroom resources ready for the work completed last holidays, and who are once again clearing classrooms ready for the work this holiday break. It is lovely to work with such a supportive hardworking community, thank you.

Collaborative Teams

As stated on Site Improvement Plan, we are currently focusing on improving student writing. To achieve this staff are working in teams of like year levels. These teams are called our collaborative teams. Staff are working collaboratively together to assess student writing, implement new strategies to improve their work and then reassess to determine progress made and implications for future practice.

The R-2 team have been utilising the Literacy Progressions to assess oral language which will result in improved writing outcomes for students. The 2-4 team and 5-7 team have been utilising Brightpath and NAPLAN assessments to analyse student writing. Brightpath is a new writing program (R-7) that helps teachers to assess children's writing and then determine specific teaching points for each student.

Assembly

Just a reminder that the final assembly will occur on July the 6th, the last Friday of term. The last assembly each term is always on a Friday to provide an opportunity for parents who are working part time to attend.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

All schools are required to collect information about the numbers of students that they provide adjustments to under the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and Disability Standards of Education (2005). From 2018, this data will be used as the basis for national funding.

The NCCD involves the collection of:

- the number of students receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students
- the level of adjustment provided to students
- student's type of disability if known

Under the model the definition of disability is broad and includes learning difficulties, health and mental health conditions. If your child is identified for inclusion in the Collection, the required information will be included in this year's data collection.

Australian Early Development Census

Playing our part to build a national picture of child health

Our school, along with thousands of others across the country will begin preparations for the fourth Australian Early Development Census (AEDC). This census is carried out with the reception children only.

The AEDC measures five key areas of development in children during their first year of full-time school to build a national picture of health and wellbeing. Since 2009, the census results have helped communities, schools and governments plan services and target support for children and families.

Teachers are trained to assess each child and answer questions. Children don't need to be present so no class time is missed. Teachers' individual assessments are then analysed by the AEDC and reported as anonymous groups of children in the final report.

In communities across the country, census results have helped communities to plan new playgrounds and parental services; schools are seeing improved student performance through new literacy programmes; and governments are using the results as evidence to develop better policies for children.

Participation in the AEDC is voluntary. Parents/carers don't need to take any action unless they choose not to include their children in the census. If you wish for your child to not be included in the census, then please see Leanne or Cinzia.

On 6th June the year 7 class went on a visit to Adelaide High School to participate in some Science activities.


